To five-year-old Audrey and her family, coming to the Achievement Centers for Children in Highland Hills feels like home, having started therapies at just six months old. From the time she was born and diagnosed with Down syndrome, her parents sought ways to provide the best opportunities for her to learn and grow, and looked to her future. Through her physical and occupational therapies, Audrey developed her strength, learned to sit, stand, walk, and jump; and has improved her speech. But for little Audrey, this is only the beginning according to her father, Lance Mason, who says, "I try to focus on not putting limits on her. I have a vision for her that is not self-limiting." Her milestones are achieved on her own schedule, and are celebrated.

By coming to the Achievement Centers for Children each week for therapy, the Masons built a close rapport with her physical therapist, Trish, who has been with them since they first came through our doors. Here, our professional staff has a personal passion and expertise for helping children and young adults reach their greatest potential. Licensed social workers in our Family Support Services offer help to families like the Mason's in conjunction with their therapies. They offer guidance for families, connections to community resources, ways for parents to best help their children, and strategies to cope with day-to-day questions and issues.

Looking to the future, the Masons began considering starting a business of their own; one in which Audrey could participate in some way as an adult. Out of their caring vision, Audrey's Chocolates was born. The mission of their business extends beyond Audrey. Their goal is to eventually employ people with disabilities and to use profits

to support research and programs for people with special needs. For now, profits from their popular handmade confections help with added tutoring and enrichments for Audrey, as well as contributions to organizations who make a social impact. Audrey will be attending day camp this summer at the Achievement Centers where she will be able to continue her therapies during the day as part of her program, and enjoy fun outdoor activities with other children. Then, in the fall, she will start kindergarten in the Shaker Heights schools. She has shown a keen interest in reading, and according to her mother, is advanced for her age. Audrey reads over 200 sight words already, and is sounding out words. Though some of her cognitive abilities aren't quite as advanced as her reading ability, thanks to her early interventions here, her expert therapists, and support of her family, she has surpassed her parents' expectations. "At first I didn't think she would ever jump, but we kept working at it. Now she walks on a balance beam. She's made so much progress, thanks to all the caring professional help we've received from the Achievement Centers," said her father.

Along the way, his eye-hand coordination improved, he became more independent and earned pride in all the new things he could do. For his graduation from occupational therapy, Carol surprised him with a graduation gown and certificate, and served refreshments to share with staff for this special occasion.
